The Cypress Hills Vineyard & Winery is located just 21 kilometres southwest of Maple Creek, on the highway to Fort Walsh and the West Block of the Cypress Hills Interprovincial Park.

Your hosts at the Vineyard, Marty and Marie Bohnet, will be delighted to provide samples of their craft wines in their spacious visitors' centre and gift shop. You might want to consider having lunch on the deck or in the gift shop. The menu is relatively short, but the prices are quite reasonable and the food quality is a real plus, not to mention that the food arrives quickly as well!

If you've an afternoon to spare, might I suggest you spend it on their deck breathing in the clear subalpine air and marvelling at the wondrous landscaping they've created in their gardens, particularly the meditation fountain cheerfully gurgling in the background. To simply sit and enjoy the sun while sipping their marvellous Rhubarb Blend (a light white wine which I

thought very reminiscent of a first-growth Chardonnay), light straw in colour and soft on the palate.

They are open from 10:00 am to 6:00 pm Tuesday through Saturday, and 12:00 pm to 6:00 pm on Sunday. While they can accommodate individuals without the need for reservations, it would be wise to make prior arrangements if several carloads of thirsty patrons intend to drop by all at once; call them at 306-662-4100.

Saskatoon Centre members Les Dickson (National Council Rep), Barb Wright (Vice-President and 2009 GA Committee Chair), and Ellen Dickson attended the 2008 General Assembly of the RASC held at York University in Toronto, Ontario, on June 27 to July 1, and hosted as a collaborative effort by three RASC Centres: Hamilton, Mississauga, and Toronto. The General Assembly (GA) of the RASC, held in rotating locations from year to year to give as many members as possible across the country a chance to attend, combines business meetings (the Annual General Meeting and National Council meetings) with scientific and social programs spread typically over a three-day weekend. In effect, an excuse for a big party!

Friday evening, the fun began (after a full day of National Council meetings) with a trip to Katz Deli for sandwiches, followed by an opportunity to browse through the EfstonScience SuperStore and Khan Scope Centre. Back at York University, there was an opening reception and tours of the York University Observatory. That evening also brought a first chance to look at Centre displays, including Saskatoon's display highlighting the SSSP, the 2009 GA, and light-pollution abatement activities in Saskatchewan. Team captains Dave Lane for the Eastern All-Stars and Glenn Hawley for the Western All-Stars led the battle for astronomy supremacy. Despite a valiant effort by the West, the Astronomy Cup went to the Eastern All-Stars.

The Helen Sawyer Hogg speaker this year was Dr. Phil Plait, best known through his Bad Astronomy website http://blogs.discovermagazine.com/badastronomy His lecture was aptly titled "Bad Astronomy," taking on bad astronomy in the media and movies, with special attention to movies with Bruce Willis in them. Phil also gave a keynote speech titled "Black Holes: Seven Ways They Can Kill You." Dr. Roberto Abraham, University of Toronto astrophysicist and holder of an NSERC Steacie Fellowship, talked about "Really Cool Stuff About the Future of Amateur Astronomy." Terence Dickinson, author of numerous astronomy books, was honoured for his many

contributions to amateur astronomy. He gave a speech looking back on his "50 Years of Amateur Astronomy and the RASC."

A particular focus of the GA this year was the upcoming International Year of Astronomy 2009. We were introduced to Kim Breland, who will be coordinating Canadian IYA projects and partners involved in helping to bring off a memorable IYA. Jim Hesser, Canadian IYA Chair, gave an inspirational kickoff for IYA, and Remi Lacasse of the FAAQ (Fédération des Astronomes Amateurs du Québec) made a presentation about Quebec IYA activities. A panel discussion on IYA included Terence Dickinson, Remi Lacasse, David Lane, Kim Hay, Kim Breland, and Denis Grey.

Saturday night was a BBQ and members' night, where Dr. Geoff Gaherty was presented with the Chant Medal. Sunday afternoon, we were all bussed to the spectacular Ontario Science Centre to tour the display Facing Mars, then on to the Mongolian Grill where we had a fabulous meal and celebrated the Hamilton Centre's centennial. The Simon Newcomb Award and Ken Chilton Prizes were presented.

The closing banquet was Sunday evening on campus. There was a lovely tribute to Bonnie Bird, with present and past Society Presidents recognizing and thanking Bonnie for 11 years of work as Executive Secretary at the RASC National HQ and wishing her well on her retirement.

National Council Meeting Report

A number of important decisions were made during the business meetings at the 2008 GA. Following is a summary of these decisions:

* By-Law Changes Required for Charities Regulation Compliance (Motion 2a of the "Essential Annual Report") - A large part of the present National By-Law #1, sections 1.01 to 3.09, was replaced to bring the RASC into compliance with the new charities regulations. These changes were necessary because certain prior practices of the RASC, particularly relating to certain transfers of funds from the national Society to Centres, were no longer compliant with Canadian law. The situation arose because the national Society is a registered charity while most of the Centres are not. The changes make it clear that the national Society is setting its own fees, Centres are free to set their own fees, and that the national Society is simply collecting fees on behalf of the Centres. The

changes were approved at the National Council meeting and ratified at the Annual General Meeting.

- * Corrective Membership Fee Increase Membership fees have to be increased to remove the Society's dependency on uncertain income from publications such as the *Observer's Handbook* and RASC Calendar and bring them in line with the actual costs of providing membership programs and services, which are currently estimated to be \$41.60. The new membership prices for Canadian members are: for Ordinary Members, \$67 (\$44 to National and \$23 to Centres); Youth Members \$41 (\$27.30 to National and \$13.70 to Centres). These changes were ratified at the Annual General Meeting.
- * Change in the Scheduling of the Annual Meeting The applicable portion of the by-laws was changed to allow for the Annual General Meeting to be held once each calendar year not more than 15 months after the previous Annual Meeting and in no case later than September 30 (rather than no later than June 30 of any

- given year as the previous version of the by-laws required). This change was made, in part, to allow Saskatoon to hold the GA next year in August.
- * Observer's Handbook There will be no change to the pricing of the OH for 2009, except for the prices charged to Sky Publishing. The 1-4 unit price for the 2010 OH will be increased \$1 to \$26.95. A change was made in the timing of OH mailings for new members. A new member that joins the Society between November 1 and December 31 of a given year will receive the OH for the next calendar year. A new member joining between January 1 and January 31 of a given year will receive that calendar year's OH. The OH will be made available at a discounted price of \$9.95 to new members joining between February 1 and October 31 who do not want to wait until the fall for their first OH.
- * RASC Calendar The 1-4 unit price for the calendar will be \$16.95, \$2.00 less for members. The 5-9 unit price will be \$10.95, the 10-24 unit price will be \$9.95.
